Make of it what you will but our record is at least as accurate as the annual Punxsutawney Phil forecast. It certainly beats odds makers in Las Vegas and handicappers at the Orange Park Kennel Club. This month, the forecast model performed less worthily than last month. While the rank correlation (ρ) between the forecast and actual rankings at Slammer & Squire was moderate (+0.53), the rank correlation today was weak (+0.24). In fact, both values
